




In 1963, Dr. King shared his dream for the American people ... “we will be able to work together, to pray together, to struggle together... to stand up for freedom together.”

After the bus boycott, Dr. King traveled to Africa and India to learn more about liberation and nonviolent protest.


When he came back to the United States, Dr. King worked for civil rights, justice, and peace.

He liked to learn so much that he finished high school, when he was 15 years old.




After high school, young Martin went to college. He graduated from Morehouse College and Boston College.
